Bark Rubbings

Resources:

- Paper
- Crayons

Methods

- 1. Find an area with some trees that are easily accessible (Ideally different types of trees).
- 2. Let the children feel the bark of the tree with their hands and notice the different textures.
- 3. Place the paper on the tree.
- 4. Using the crayon, rub the paper to see what kind of textures you can show.
- 5. Repeat on different texture.

Talking Points:

- Why do different trees have different textures?
- What is the name of the tree?
- Why are trees important?

Create a picture using natural resources

Resources

- Imagination
- Some loose natural materials such a pinecones, sticks, seaweed, stones, pine needles etc.

Methods

- 1. Find an area with natural loose material (See location page for suggestions).
- 2. Allow children to use their imagination to create a picture OR suggest some themes such as woodland or sea creatures, people.

Natural Dyes Paintings

Resources

- Uncooked beetroot
- Charcoal
- Green vegetation (Leaves, grass etc)
- Easily breakable rocks (sandstone)
- Clay
- Paint brushes (OR you can use fingers)
- Containers for paints to be mixed with water
- Glue
- Paper, or collect stones
- Stone or herb grinder

Methods:

- 1. Prepare the paints with the group by grinding down the materials to create a pulp.
- 2. Mix glue and water and stir the mixture.
- 3. Using paint brushes or fingers to paint pictures.

Talking Points:

- Where do these materials come from?
- Human uses of natural dyes.
- Harvesting sustainably.
- How can humans live alongside nature?

Hanging Mobile

Resources

- 1 stick per child
- String (Can be any colour or any material)

Methods

- 1. Find an area with natural materials, ideally woodland.
- 2. Tie the material you find such a pinecones, sticks.
