




Air tickets are so cheap today! Planes fly so fast, so you get to spend more time enjoying your holiday. And flying is so exciting, up there looking at the

That's why every year more and more people travel by plane, and they go to fantastic faraway places on the other side of the world - Thailand, Perù. Bora Bora!

But did you know that flying is a big problem for the environment? The problem is air pollution. Planes use lots and lots of fuel, and their fumes are adding many gases that cause climate change.

That's how much carbon dioxide (CO₂) a plane produces on one flight from Malta to London and back... for each passenger! That's as much CO₂ as you would produce with 900 laundry washes... or 330 days of nonstop watching TV!

Some people feel bad about polluting the air when they travel on planes. So they try to use less planes and more trains, because trains are much cleaner than planes. In Sweden, less people used planes this year than last year, and the people using trains doubled!

The season for trapping song thrushes (mlievez) and golden plovers (pluvieri) has opened again, and it's sad news for birds. There's a nasty surprise too, because now the trappers can use finer nets. That means the squares in the new nets are smaller, and what does that mean? It means many more birds will be caught, of course. And smaller birds like hawfinch (taż-żebbug) too.

Between you and me, I wasn't too keen on the creepy crawlers in our path, but the BirdLife Crew showed us that getting up close to them wasn't as scary at all if you are gentle. They helped us understand how nocturnal creatures cannot see very well in the dark, so they use their senses to find their way around and gather food. So we closed our eyes, and used our noses to identify different foods, and our voices and ears to find 'moths' just like bats.

BTW, aren't **BATS** the coolest?! I got to see loads of them at Ghadira! It was getting dark, so they were waking up and super hungry! Our guide had this wicked device that can hear the bats' voices and turn them into noises that we could hear.

I really did not feel like leaving, but I was getting hungry so we walked back to the Hide to say goodbye. Before we left we even got a funky wooden pencil box complete with colours, eraser and sharpener! I was just wondering why it says "BOV for Kids", then they said that the gift was from Bank of Valletta who wanted to help BirdLife encourage more kids connect with nature.



Raptors are not always easy to watch because they often fly high up. You need binoculars to see the details and to really enjoy birds of prey.

A great place to enjoy birds of prey is Buskett. That's because the tired birds often land in the old trees for a nice long sleep!

The best way to learn to identify birds of prey is to have an expert friend near you. So if you want to be a raptor fan, make sure you stay in BirdLife because that's where all the bird experts are!




40,000 types of plants and 3,000 different types of insects live there.

The Amazon rainforest is the largest tropical forest in the world. It is found in South America and if we would lay the Amazon out over the United States, it would cover over half of it!


One million people live in the Amazon forest. They are divided in about 400 tribes.

The Amazon river is the second largest river in the world - it is 6,400 km (4000 miles) long!



Vhat you need

Binoculars


You really need binoculars if you want to be a birdwatcher. Birds are very shy and won't let you go near them. And many of them

are really small. With a good pair of binoculars you will see them up close and you'll enjoy all their lovely detail and behaviour. Without disturbing them!

Field guide

More than 400 species of birds have so far been seen in Malta. Many of them are easy to tell apart, but many others are not so easy, and some are really hard. A good field guide like the Collins Bird Guide will tell you what to look for when trying to identifying a mystery bird. A field guide is also small and lightweight, so you can take it with you out in the countryside.

Notebook

You don't need a notebook to see birds and to identify them. But keeping a diary of what you see is a good habit because it will help you get used to the birds of the different seasons and different places you visit. Keeping record is also very good science.

Everyone can be a birdwatcher.

You don't need to be an expert or a scientist, or even a grown-up. If you're curious about the birds around you, you're ready to become a birdwatcher.

Get your tools ready.

To start off you need binoculars and a field guide (see the yellow box). They can be a bit expensive but hey! you only buy them once, and they can serve you many years. You need to look after them, though, so don't bang your binoculars about, or use your field guide as an umbrella.

Find a nice birdsy place

Now find a nice place to watch birds. Luckily birds turn up in all sorts of places - they even snoop around our homes. Spanish sparrows are always on the look out for food that we drop, and Sardinian warblers too live around people's homes. In winter they are joined by robins and starlings and black redstarts. So you can birdwatch even out of your bedroom window.

But of course to see more birds you need to get out. Thanks to BirdLife, today there are nature reserves that you can visit for some easy birdwatching. At our nature reserves like Ghadira, Is-Simar and Salina you can use special rooms called hides where you can sit cosy and hidden so birds won't spot you while you're busy

spotting herons and grebes and sandpipers. Places like Foresta 2000 and Buskett are good spots for woodland birds.

Keep still. Keep quiet.

Birds are very shy of people, so when you're out birdwatching don't do crazy things that will scare them away. Don't shout, wave or run about. Keep as still as you can and when you move do it slowly. And make sure your phone is on quiet mode.

If you scare a bird and it flies away it won't come back any time soon. Don't chase it.

Be invisible.

Be careful where you sit. Find a spot where you don't stick out. If there's a wall sit behind it not on top of it. Trees and shrubs are also good places to hide behind.

Don't wear bright clothes. Greens, greys, browns and blacks are best so that you'll be camouflaged, like a chameleon.

Be comfy.

Make sure you don't wear too much or too little. A good idea is to wear clothes in layers, so you can take layers off if it gets hot, and put them on again if gets cool. A cap helps protect your head from the sun and if it has a front flap it shades your eyes from the glare, so you can see better.

Find a good time.

Many birds wake up early to look for food. They are very active at that time, so morning is the best time for a birdwatcher to spot them. In summer it's best to avoid the early afternoon, because that's when many birds take a siesta!



Good company!

Birdwatching is fun, but it's a hundred times more fun when you can share it! When you're with other birdwatchers you can share the fun of spotting exciting species, and there are more eyes to spot and more ears to listen for bird calls. And if there are expert birdwatchers about they will help you with tricky species. That's why it's a good idea to be a member of BirdLife Malta – because that's where all the best birdwatchers are!
