Volunteering policy

1. Purpose:

The purpose is to establish the guidelines and expectations for volunteers who work with our organisation.

2. Eligibility:

Any individual who shares our mission to protect and preserve birds and their habitats, and who is willing to donate their time and skills, is eligible to become a volunteer.

3. Volunteer Opportunities:

Volunteer opportunities vary depending on the needs at certain time of the season.

4. Training and Support:

All volunteers will receive appropriate training and support to carry out their tasks effectively. This may include training sessions, access to resources and materials, and ongoing support from staff and other volunteers.

5. Responsibilities:

Volunteers are expected to always conduct themselves in a professional and respectful manner and to follow the policies and procedures of the organisation.

6. Liability:

The organisation accepts no liability for injury, loss or damage sustained by volunteers while engaged in volunteer activities.

7. Confidentiality:

Volunteers must maintain confidentiality with regard to all information they access while volunteering with the organisation.

8. Recognition:

The organisation recognizes and appreciates the contributions of its volunteers and may offer opportunities for recognition and advancement.

9. Termination:

The organisation reserves the right to terminate the volunteer relationship at any time, for any reason.

By volunteering with our organisation, volunteers agree to abide by this policy.



Basic principles of volunteering

The basic principles of volunteering are centered around making a positive impact on birds and their habitats, communities and supporting the organisation's mission. This includes acting with integrity and professionalism, upholding the organisation's policies and procedures, and treating all individuals, including other volunteers and staff, with respect and kindness. Volunteers are also expected to embrace ongoing learning and development, both in terms of their own personal growth and in support of the organisation's efforts. Additionally, volunteers are encouraged to collaborate with each other and with staff, sharing skills, knowledge, and experiences to achieve the greatest impact.

Organization and coordination of volunteering

The organization and coordination of volunteering is crucial to ensure that our efforts are focused and effective. Volunteer activities are managed and coordinated by staff, who work closely with volunteers to identify opportunities and match skills and interests with specific tasks. Regular communication and feedback mechanisms are in place to ensure that volunteers are supported and have the information they need to be successful in their roles. The organisation also regularly evaluates its volunteer program to ensure that it is meeting the needs of both the organisation and its volunteers.
